

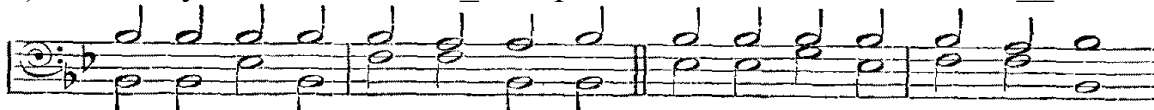

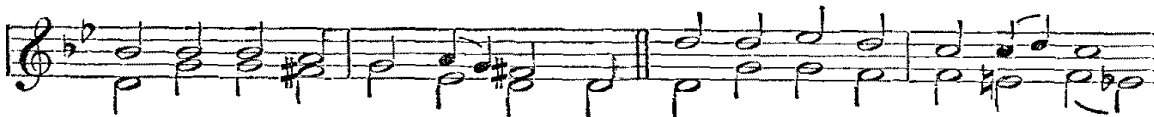
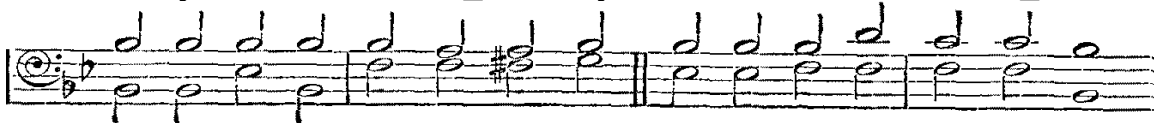

- 3) E-v'ry task, how-e - ver sim-ple, sets the soul that does it free;

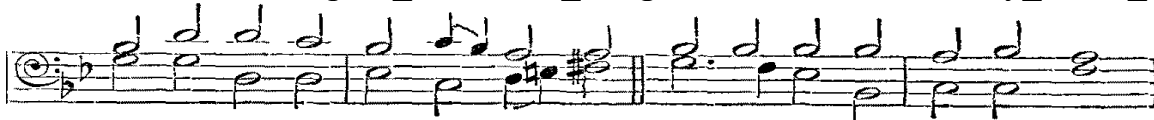


They who work with-out com-plai-ning do the ho-ly will of God;
